AEROPLANE MISHAP.

One of the two Piper Aztec planes from Anguilla Airways, was damaged when it attempted landing at St. Eustatius's airport last Wednese day. It is reported that the plane piloted by Mr. Maurice Connor touched down and after experiencing brake failure, soared the plane into the air once more. On doing so one of the wings caught into a fence and ripped it. Mr. Connor then flew to St. Marten, about 40 miles away without landing on St. Eustatius.

The plane is now in St, Marten with a damaged wing and propeller.

NEW AIRPORT ?

Bulldozers are presently clearing an area in Brimigin for the proposed Anguilla Airport. Work on clearing the area started about 3 weeks ago, and the Finance Committee made up of all Council Members, voted \$1,300 for the clearing of the land. H.M. Commissioner has also invited an Airport Expert to advise on the present project.

COST OF THE ANGUILLA OPERATION.

Answering questions in the House of Commons, put by Mr. Neil Marten, the Under-Secretary for Foreign and Commonwealth Affairs (Mr. William Whitlock) said that the costs of the Anguilla exercise from Mid-March to the end of June had been £100,000 to his ministry, which included £88,000 for the Anguilla Police Unit of British officers. Mr. Denis Healy, Minister of Defence, revealed that the cost to his Ministry, also to the end of June, was"a little over £500,000". (From the CONCH SHELL June 1969).

The idea of making plans or a les Airport at a different location to the present one is very wise, and should have the blessings of all concerned. But in doing so we must consider the other amenities that go along with a Jet Airport, that is Hotel Accomodations, Water Supply Electricity etc. Having Jets coming here will require a certain amount of Hotel Accomodation, All these things must be considered in a general layout plan to encourage Tourism, a Jet Airport alone will not do it and our present Hotel facilities are far from satisfying Jet services, Another aspect to consider is the cost of building and maintaining such an Airport.

It is not very wise to consentrate all the energy on this project The whole infrastructure of Tourist Development will have to be considered and be developed together. All this will not happen over-night. Meanwhile extension of the present Tarmac on the Airstrip now, should be considered so it can be much safer for the small planes to land, and take-off, which will also make it possible for the LII.A.T. Avro to come in. This will cast only a drop in the bucket as to the cost of the generallayout for long term Development.

Basseterre, St. Kitts, August 15th. The St. Kitts police today recovered the body of 13-year-old Peter Earle from the Basseterre Harbour mear Fort Point.

Peter, the third son of Mr, and Mrs. George H. Warner, was reported missing yesterday when he failed to return home. A search party comprising police, members of the island's Defence Force and family friends combed New Town Bay where Peter's . bothes were found by Mr, Alexis Knight, Comptroller of inland revenue.

George Town, Cayman Islands, August 15 The Cayman Islands which seven years ago chose to remain a British Colony now feel that the time has come for them to have greater autonomy.

After unanimously passing a motion calling for the constitutional advance of the Islands, the Legislative a assembly selected a Committee to examine the present Constitution and make recommendations to the Secretary of State.

Speaking on the motion which was tabled by Miss Annie Bodden, the Assembly's only woman member. representatives expressed the view that the time had come for Caymanians to have more say in controlling their affairs.

Legislators also felt the public was ready to support the advance. Chairman of the Committee which is made up of the Assembly's appointed members is Mr. C.A. Hunter, M.B.E. Who seconded Miss Bodden's motion. Both Miss Bodden and Mr. Hunter c emphasised that they were not suggesting that the Cayman Islands were ready for full Internal Self-Government. The Cayman Islands consisting of three Islands - Grand Cayman, Cayman Brac and Little Cayman -- Decided to remain a Colony after Neighbouring Jamaica who formerly exercised supervisory powers, became Independent in 1962.
